Town-Wide Yard Sale a Big Success!

On September 28th, The Town of Upper Marlboro joined the ranks of hundreds of other towns and cities by hosting an event to give back to our community. The “Day To Serve” program, which lasted for 15 days, is an annual effort across MD, VA, WVA and DC, to help local groups provide assistance to the elderly and the disabled, help clean the planet, and/or, feed the hungry. For this 2nd Annual Day To Serve event, our Town decided to bring back the popular Town-Wide Yard Sale and make it a food drive too. Residents Travis and Melissa Welch graciously volunteered to organize the event that brought in \$164 in cash donations and over 100 pounds of non-

perishable food items that were donated to the Upper Marlboro Food Bank that afternoon. The Town also offered sellers the option to leave behind what they didn’t sell, so that it could all be donated to the Fuller Center for Housing Thrift Store located in Town at 14940 Main Street—an estimated \$125 worth of goods were donated! THE BISHOP'S CURSE

The following story was submitted to the Town from Prince George's Co. Historian Susan Pearl. The 1903 article was written by Susan E. Claggett, writer for the *Baltimore Sunday Herald*, and was originally entitled “Upper Marlboro of Today”.

There is a story told of the great [Methodist] revivalist, Bishop Whitefield, that is interesting in connection with the alleged wickedness of the town. He was holding meetings in the place and the people did not respond as he thought they should, or something else roused his indignation, then his anger. He shook the dust of the village from off his feet and cursed the place in a way that was customary in medieval days. The devil was in Marlborough and would stay there, he said as each of the three exits

of the town was protected by a church of God, he thought there could be no escape for his satanic majesty.

St. Mary's Catholic Church stood then, as now, on the road crossing the Western Branch and leading into the Forest and toward Annapolis. Trinity Church occupied the site of the Presbyterian church of pioneer days, and was located on the road to Croome and the lower neighborhood, and the Methodist Church South closed the road to Washington. [As long as the churches stood

at the exits of the village, the devil would remain strong in Marlborough.]

There was no escape. But Whitefield overlooked the frailness of the building from which he hurled anathemas against sinning Marlborough. For long it stood, a tottering structure, protesting against the irony of fate, but at last it yielded to the temptations of the devil, and over the ruins of the old frame building its arch enemy sped on his way to Washington, leaving the print of his cloven hoof upon the surrounding community.

On the Agenda

The Town has filed its application to become a “Sustainable Community”. We will know in a couple months if we were successful. If we become a “Sustainable Community”, new tools will then be available for investing in improvements for the Town. We will hold an open discussion on the goals for the Town.

On January 6, 2014 the Town will hold elections for the Board of Town Commissioners. Please consider running for office. Since 1870, the Town has had a three commissioner form of government. Given the increasing complexity of running a local government and lack of competitive elections, we will be discussing alternatives, or changes, to our current form of government. We also will be swearing-in our Board of Supervisors of Elections—contact us now if you would like to be an election judge on the Board, there is monetary compensation for your time.

Our contract with the County for recycling services is up for renewal on October 31st. We will be discussing renewal and alternatives.

The cost of repaving Marlborough Drive and Marlborough Circle was under the budgeted amount. The Commissioners will be discussing transferring the surplus from that line item to the Public Works Maintenance line item.

The final items on the agenda include the Frederick Douglass High School Homecoming Parade application for Saturday, October 26th, and planning for the Town's Holiday Party.
